If you're using a timer for exterior lighting, make sure its weatherproof and intended for outdoor use.

Many Christmas tree farms, and even retailers like Lowe's and Home Depot, give away greenery clippings from recently trimmed trees. With a little twine, extra ornaments, and sparkly ribbon, you can create beautiful garlands and wreaths to hang over your front door or windows. To add extra twinkle at night, install solar-powered spotlights to illuminate your new greenery. Because solar spotlights run on energy from the sun, there is no added cost to your power bill.

# PATRICIA BEASLEY RETIRES




Bill Walden, Executive Vice President, congratulates Patricia Beasley on her retirement after having completed over 31 years of service to the Cooperative.

Georgia Agricultural Tax Exemption (GATE) is an agricultural sales and use tax exemption certificate issued by the Georgia Department of Agriculture. The document identifies its user as a qualified farmer or producer who is exempt from sales tax on the inputs used in the production of their commodity.

Qualified producers must apply/re-apply with the Georgia Department of Agriculture each year to receive the exemption. Excelsior EMC members that qualify must provide Excelsior EMC with a copy of their renewed GATE card. We must receive a copy of the new card by December 31, 2022 for the exemption to continue.

Producers that have never received GATE can also apply. First-time applicants to Excelsior EMC will need to provide a copy of their GATE card as well as an Excelsior EMC GATE form that can be picked up at either our Metter office or Statesboro office.
