UNLOCK COMFORT and SAVINGS

Consider adding home weatherization to your summer to-do list. While we often think about weatherizing our homes during the winter when we feel the chill from windows and drafty doors, it actually provides comfort and energy savings year-round. This is especially beneficial during the summer months when your air conditioner is working overtime.

1. Energy Efficiency and Savings

According to energystar.gov, a home with insufficient insulation and air leaks wastes more than 20% of the energy used to heat or cool the home, which is essentially throwing money out the door. Fortunately, most weatherization projects are easy to DIY and can be completed in a day.

2. Simple Weatherization Strategies

Air Sealing Around Windows

- Inspect for air leaks:
 - Look for daylight around the frame
 - Check if windows rattle easily or have small cracks.
- Apply new caulk if necessary:
 - Remove old caulk and clean the area.
 - Use about half a cartridge of caulk per window.
 - Silicone caulk is a popular choice; use leftover caulk to seal joints in bathrooms and kitchens.

Installing Weatherstripping Around Exterior Doors

Weatherstripping is another simple but effective weatherization project. Common types include V-channel, felt, and foam tape. To choose the best type for your home, consider temperature fluctuations and weather exposure. Most homeowners

opt for felt or foam tape; both are easy to install but need replacement every couple of years, depending on wear and tear.

- Install weatherstripping around the top and sides of doors.
- If daylight is visible around the bottom of the door, install a door sweep. Door sweeps come in aluminum, plastic, vinyl, and felt options.
- Weatherstripping can also be installed around windows, typically on the sides of doublehung or sliding windows, or around the window sash.

3. Improving Home Comfort with Insulation

Another way to improve comfort in your home is by adding insulation. While this project is more costly and typically requires professional help, it's highly effective in decreasing heat flow, thus impacting energy use in both winter and summer months. Older homes may need additional insulation to replace outdated materials or meet newer efficiency standards. 4. Additional Benefits of Air Sealing

In addition to saving energy, air sealing can help you:

Energy Scams

Consumers with water, gas, and electricity connections have long been targets for utility scams. In today's digital world, every swipe and click increases this risk. Scammers have become more sophisticated, adapting their tactics to trick unsuspecting consumers through various methods.

Excelsior EMC wants to help you avoid energy scams that could lead to financial loss or a leak of personal information. This month, we're sharing updates on the latest utility scams and tips to help you stay safe.

Recent Utility Scams

Scammers often disguise themselves as utility employees or representatives to steal money or personal information. A common trick is to claim a bill is past due and threaten to disconnect service unless immediate payment is made. Scammers use phone calls, text messages, emails, and even in-person visits, but digital attacks are increasingly common.

New technologies like caller ID spoofing make it appear that calls are from trusted sources, making it harder to verify authenticity. Another scam involves fraudulent websites that mimic utility payment pages, often promoted on search engines to trick consumers into making payments. Additionally, scammers may contact you claiming you overpaid your bill and will receive a cash or banking refund, which is a ploy to steal personal information.

Spotting a Scam

Watch for these red flags to identify a scam:

- High-pressure tactics creating a sense of urgency, such as immediate service disconnection threats.
- Requests for unusual payment methods, like gift cards or cryptocurrency.
- Poor grammar, spelling errors, and odd email addresses in digital communications.
